

A zooarchaeologist, Woollett has a fieldwork background in northern Canada and the North Atlantic. The bulk of his work has concerns hunting and herding economies in variable arctic and subarctic environments. In particular, he has focused on examining how Inuit have employed seasonal harvesting and settlement strategies to accommodate both their dynamic environmental setting (the « Little Ice Age ») and increasingly pervasive European cultural contacts (c. 1600 -1850 CE). Woollett has been the prehistoric archaeologist of the University Laval and member of the *Groupe de recherche en archéometrie* since 2004 and member of the *Centre d'études nordiques* since 2007. He is currently conducting field research projects in Labrador and Iceland as part of the "Dynamic Inuit Social Strategies in Changing Environments: A Long- Term Perspective" Project (Government of Canada Program for the International Polar Year) and the NABO National Science Foundation International Polar Year program. He directs the Laboratory of Prehistoric Archaeology and Bioarchaeology of the Université Laval.
